ANNOUNCER: (V.O.):

The blue jay is one of Canada's most colourful birds and often one of its noisiest.

Its shrill call serves as a warning to other creatures of the woods.

The blue jay can be found from Newfoundland to Alberta, and prefers to nest in mixed-wood forests.

[Blue jay chick with the mouth open]

Both male and female participate in the incubation of eggs for a period of 17 days. The young are fed all types of food, including insects, caterpillars, and some berries, and fruit land grain.

[Two blue jay eating grains]

The blue jay is one of the few birds that store food for future use, and some of the acorns so stored take root and eventually become beautiful hardwood trees.
