The great blue heron is Canada's largest and most abundant heron.

With its long stilt-like legs, long neck, and spear-shaped bill, it is well equipped for wading into the water and catching the small fish that make up most of its diet.

Great blue herons usually nest in colonies. Male and female both help build the nest. When the eggs hatch, the parents take turns feeding the young.

The young develop quickly, and after about eight weeks are ready to test their wings.

The slow, graceful flight of the great blue heron makes it one of our most spectacular birds.
